### Prime & Composite Numbers



- Prime Numbers are numbers whose only factors are 1 and itself
  - Except for 2, every other prime number is odd.

$$5 = 1 \times 5$$
  $7 = 1 \times 7$   
 $2,3,5,7,11,13,17,...$ 

Composite Numbers are numbers that are not prime

$$9 = 1x9$$

$$9 = 3x3$$

### Fractions



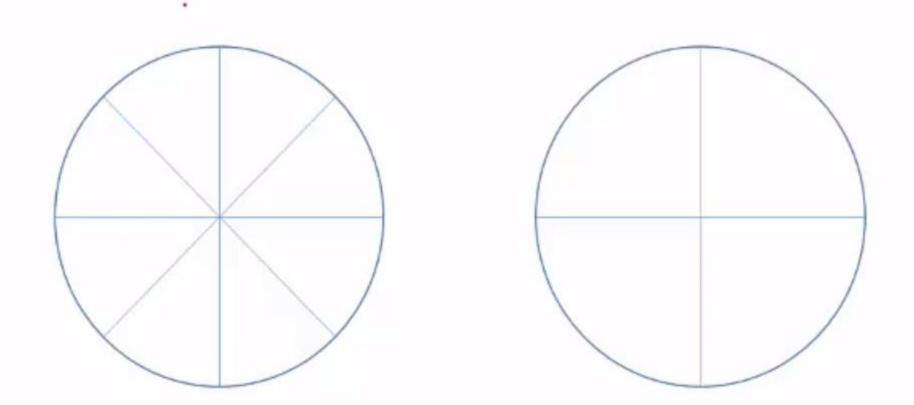
- A fraction represents a part (or parts) of a whole
  - The <u>denominator</u> (bottom number) represents how many equal parts the whole is divided into
  - The <u>numerator</u> (top number) in the fraction represents how many of the parts are taken (or remain, depending on the context)
  - Examples:

 A vulgar fraction whose numerator is less than the denominator is a proper fraction

# Equivalent Fractions



 Equivalent fractions are fractions that represent the same value though their numerators and denominators are different



### Reducing Fractions





- Step 1: Find a factor (but not 1) that both the numerator and denominator have in common
- Step 2: Divide both the numerator and denominator by this common factor
- Step 3: Repeat Steps 1 and 2 until the numerator and denominator no longer have any factors in common (until it is in "lowest terms")

# Mixed Numbers and Improper Fractions

- Mixed Number: A number consisting of an integer part and a fractional part
  - Examples:





- Mixed Number: A number consisting of an integer part and a fractional part

- Improper Fraction: A fraction whose numerator is greater than the denominator
  - Examples:

# Changing Improper Fractions to Mixed Numbers



- Step 1: Divide the numerator by the denominator
- Step 2: The whole number quotient found in Step 1 will be the whole number part of the mixed number
- Step 3:
  - A) The remainder found in Step 1 will be the numerator of the fraction in the mixed number
  - B) The denominator for the mixed number remains the same as it was in the improper fraction

### Decimals



- Decimals are another way to expressing fractional parts of a whole
  - The denominators in decimal fractions are powers of 10
  - · The place values to the right of the decimal point mirror those to the left of it

Thousand's	Hundred's	Ten's	One's	Tenth's	Hundredth's	Thousandth's
			0	3	5	
			0	0	1	9

# Changing Decimals to Vulgar Fractions



O. .

- Step 1: The numerals to the right of the decimal point will be the numerator of the vulgar fraction
- Step 2: Count the number of place values to the right of the decimal point to determine the denominator
  - · Hint: This number will tell you how many 0's are in the denominator

# Changing Decimals to Fractions Practice



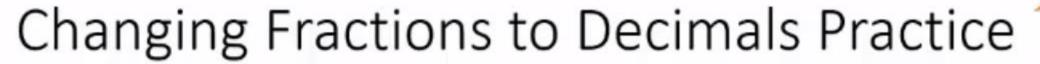

 To convert fractions to decimals, simply divide the numerator by the denominator

Change the fractions to decimals:

### Percent



- Percent: means "out of 100"
  - Percentages can be expressed as fractions with a denominator of 100
  - Once in fraction form, reduce if possible

$$15\% = \frac{15\div 5}{100\div 5} = \frac{3}{20}$$

 To <u>change a decimal to a percentage</u>, multiply the decimal by 100 (move the decimal point 2 places to the right)

$$78 \times 100 = 78 \% = \frac{78}{100}$$

 To <u>change a fraction to a percentage</u>, change the fraction to a decimal, then multiply by 100

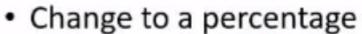




 Example: You get a 90% on a test that had 30 questions. How many questions did you answer correctly?

- Step 1: Change the percentage to a decimal by moving the decimal point 2 places to the left
- Step 2: Multiply the decimal form of the percentage (from Step 1) by the given amount

### Practice with Percentages



• 3) You take a test that has 25 questions and get 96% correct. How many questions did you answer correctly?

• 4) Express 48 minutes as a percentage of one hour  $48 \, \text{mins}$  48 + 12 = 4 = 80 %

$$\frac{4}{5} = 80.\% = 80\%$$
